5TH Annual National Prevention Conference


- CALL FOR ABSTRACTS Poster Presentations

The youngest smoke more

Data from the large EU research project ALEC showed that all age groups have experienced a decline in the numbers starting smoking since 1970, except for the age group 11 - 15 years old, especially during the last 10 years. The results showed that smoking increased most amongst young women in Western Europe, where 40 per 1000 start smoking every year, compared to 20 in 1970. For young men in Northern Europe, the numbers have remained relatively constant. Read more

Big-data study pinpoints more than 150 genes associated with atrial fibrillation

Drawing on genomic data from more than one million individuals, researchers from the University of Michigan have led a large collaborative effort to discover as-yet unknown genetic risk factors for atrial fibrillation. The increased understanding the study yields of the biological processes underlying atrial fibrillation could lead to better treatment and prevention. Read <u>more</u>

Compounds in 'monster' radish could help tame cardiovascular disease

In a study appearing in American Chemical Society's 'Journal of Agricultural and Food Chemistry, scientists report that compounds found in the Sakurajima Daikon, or 'monster' radish, could help protect coronary blood vessels and potentially prevent heart disease and stroke. The finding could lead to the discovery of similar substances in other vegetables and perhaps lead to new drug treatments. Read more

Rapid heart imaging technique may cut costs, boosting care in developing world

A newly developed rapid imaging protocol quickly and cheaply diagnosed heart ailments in patients in Peru, according to new research in Journal of the *American Heart Association*. In this study, researchers developed and tested a rapid CMR (Cardiac Magnetic Resonance) protocol using contrast dye that measured cardiac structure, function and scarring. The rapid diagnostics worked with existing infrastructure, took 18 minutes and cost \$150 per patient resulting in important changes in patient care. Read more

Experts warn of cardiovascular risk from heavy metal pollution

Even low doses of toxic chemicals in the environment pose a significant risk to cardiovascular health, according to a report in today's edition of *The BMJ*, led by researchers at the University of Cambridge. The researchers have also challenged the omission of environmental risk factors such as toxic metal contaminants in water and foods from the recent World Health Organization report on non-communicable diseases (NCDs). Drug could aid recovery after a heart attack

Drugs currently undergoing development to treat anaemia could be repurposed to help prevent people with Type 2 diabetes from developing heart failure, according to new research funded by the British Heart Foundation and Diabetes UK. Read more

The European Society of Cardiology held their 2018 Congress over five days in Munich this year, showcasing latest clinical trials and breakthrough discoveries to almost 31,000 delegates from 150 countries. This year, Congress featured a new Digital Health area with live demonstrations of cutting-edge solutions and technologies.
